### April is HIE Awareness Month.

Parents, families, clinicians, and researchers from around the world come together during the month of April to raise awareness about hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy (HIE)—a type of brain injury that can occur before, during, or shortly after birth.

Through advocacy, education, and community events, HIE Awareness Month shines a light on the experiences of affected children and families, promotes early intervention and prevention efforts, and fuels critical research aimed at improving outcomes and finding hope for the future.

### Blue and yellow are the colors of HIE awareness.

Blue represents the **grief, trauma, and heaviness** that families experience after a child is affected by HIE.

Yellow represents the hope for a world without HIE, and the **light of our** children in our arms and in our hearts.

When blue and yellow come together, we have a path toward a world without HIE through research, education, and advocacy. Together, our community of families, clinicians, scientists, and advocates work tirelessly on behalf of babies and children so that one day every child will be protected from the devastation of hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy.



# What is HIE?

HIE is a devastating brain injury that primarily affects premature infants. HIE can also affect full term babies, especially when there are complications during labor and delivery—such as reduced oxygen or blood flow to the baby's brain—caused by events like placental abruption, uterine rupture, cord prolapse, or prolonged labor.
